MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD CHAIR

On behalf of the Board of Endometriosis Australia, I am delighted to reflect on a transformative year marked by unprecedented growth in community awareness and engagement.

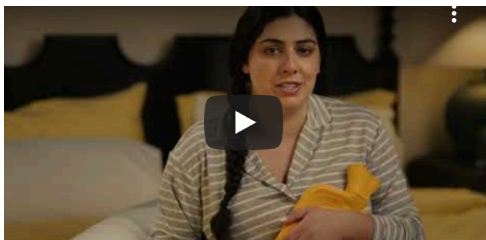
As I complete my second year as Chair, I am pleased to report that the 2025 financial year has been distinguished by extraordinary partnerships that have fundamentally strengthened our ability to reach and support the near 1 million Australian's living with endometriosis.

Our partnership with Southern Cross Austereo (SCA), which commenced in January 2024, has been transformative. SCA donated production and distribution of radio advertisements across their national network throughout the year.

The radio campaign launched in February 2024, complemented by a television commercial on regional channels from July 2024. Research conducted by SCA in September 2024 revealed that Endometriosis Australia is now the #1 organisation Australians recall when asked about endometriosis support, with those exposed to our campaign 47% more likely to be aware of us. With the partnership ending in December 2025, I look forward to even better awareness results to report next year.



Australian College of Nursing



Our partnership with the Australian College of Nursing has been equally significant. We launched the EndoAcademy in January 2025 and received 80 applications for the Nurse Scholarships in Endometriosis. We commenced training with 20 nurses – a significant milestone towards our goal of training 100 specialist endometriosis nurses by 2027.

Governance and Risk Management

Endometriosis Australia remains committed to maintaining the highest standards of governance, transparency, and accountability in all aspects of its operations. In 2025, the organisation continued to strengthen its governance framework to support sustainable growth, stakeholder trust, and mission delivery.

Board Governance

Our Board of Directors, comprised of professionals with diverse expertise in healthcare, finance, law, media, advocacy and lived experience of endometriosis, met regularly throughout the year to provide strategic oversight and ensure compliance with regulatory obligations. The Board reviewed and updated key policies, including conflict of interest, financial controls, and stakeholder engagement, to reflect best practice and evolving organisational needs.

Board Committees and Groups

Our members are the owners of Endometriosis Australia with voting rights and other privileges as outlined in our Constitution.

The Board of Directors serves as our primary governing body, overseeing the strategic direction of the organisation. The General Manager manages day-to-day operations under the delegation of the Board.

The Finance, Risk and Audit Committee supports the Board by providing oversight in financial management, auditing processes and organisational risk.

The Marketing and Fundraising Committee supports the Board by driving awareness and securing essential resources through strategic campaigns, partnerships and community engagement to advance Endometriosis Australia's mission.

The Clinical Advisory Committee offers expert guidance to the Board on research priorities and funding decisions.

Our Ambassadors and Endo Champions appointed by the Board, generously volunteer their time and energy to educate the community, raise awareness about endometriosis, and drive fundraising efforts.

Risk Management Framework

Endometriosis Australia operates under a structured risk management framework aligned with the principles of ISO 31000. We review of our risk register periodically, identifying key risks across operational, financial, reputational, and strategic domains. By refining mitigation strategies and enhancing internal controls, we aim to safeguard organisational integrity, maintain stakeholder trust, and position the charity for sustainable impact in advancing awareness, education, and research into endometriosis.

Compliance and Reporting

The organisation maintained full compliance with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC) requirements, submitting its Annual Information Statement and financial reports on time. Internal audits and external financial reviews were conducted to ensure integrity and transparency in financial management.

Ethical and Inclusive Leadership

Endometriosis Australia continues to champion ethical leadership and inclusive governance. In 2025, we expanded our advisory structures to include more voices from the lived experience community, ensuring that our programs and advocacy efforts remain grounded in the realities of those affected by endometriosis.

Looking Ahead

As we prepare for future growth and impact, Endometriosis Australia will continue to invest in governance capability, risk resilience, and stakeholder trust. Our commitment to strong governance is foundational to achieving our mission: to increase awareness, education, and research into endometriosis, and to improve the lives of those affected.

MEDICAL DIRECTOR REPORT

A/Professor Anusch Yazdani



In 2025, the Clinical Advisory Committee of Endometriosis Australia continued to strengthen the understanding, management, and support of those with lived experience of endometriosis across Australia. Over the past year, the committee focused on evidence-based clinical improvement, research support, education, and national advocacy—delivering meaningful progress for patients, clinicians, and policymakers.

Clinical Guidelines and Best Practice Development

The committee contributed significantly to refining and promoting contemporary clinical best practice, specifically the Australian Living Guideline: Endometriosis. This included updating guidance relating to diagnostic pathways, surgical and medical management, long-term pain strategies, and interdisciplinary models of care.

Education and Professional Engagement

Education remained a central focus in 2025. Members led webinars, workshops, and public-facing information sessions aimed at supporting both clinicians and the broader community. A highlight for the team was the 16th World Congress on Endometriosis in Sydney, where every member of Endometriosis Australia's Clinical Advisory Committee played a prominent role on the congress, either on the organising committee, chairing pre-congress workshops, or delivering invited sessions and presentations. These activities placed Endometriosis Australia on the world stage as an example of a support and advocacy group. The committee's educational contributions strengthened continuing professional development and provided clear, practical resources for general practitioners, specialists, nurses, and allied health professionals.

Research Funding and Supported Projects

Endometriosis Australia approved five new research projects in 2025, allocating a total of \$270,000 in competitive seed funding. These projects spanned three major domains:

- Patient-centred tools and decision aids, including the EndoChoice co-designed decision support resource.
- Resources for priority populations, focusing on equitable access and culturally informed health communication.
- Interdisciplinary care models and basic science investigations, including work on genomics, spatial transcriptomics, and antimicrobial peptides in the context of endometriosis biology.

These studies reflect the committee's commitment to advancing translational research and improving real-world outcomes for people living with endometriosis.

Conclusion

The Clinical Advisory Committee has delivered a productive and influential year of work. Through leadership in clinical standards, education, research support, and advocacy, the committee exemplifies the mission of Endometriosis Australia. These achievements provide strong momentum for continued progress in 2026 and beyond.



ADVOCACY & GOVERNMENT

As a co-founder, Deputy Chair, and longest-serving Director, it has been a privilege to volunteer my time to improve care for all who are living with and are affected by endometriosis.

I want to thank all of our ambassadors and volunteers for taking time from their busy schedules to help create change for everyone impacted by this insidious disease. I'd like to personally thank our South Australian Ambassador, Deanna Flynn-Wallis, for working with and guiding me on the needs of the people of South Australia for the State Government Parliamentary Select Committee Enquiry on endometriosis. This enquiry, chaired by Member for Waite, Catherine Hutchesson, made 20 recommendations centred around improving the lives of people living with this painful condition. The state

The Endometriosis Expert Advisory Group (EAG) provided a comprehensive response to the report and recommendations made. EAG provided significant contributions to the report and recommendations made through multiple initiatives. They delivered extensive media campaigns, provided regular spokesperson services including their Clinical Advisory Committee, and produced Australia's first endometriosis TV commercial alongside billboard advertising and podcasts. EA particularly focused on reaching rural, regional, and remote locations to increase national coverage. They maintained regular sector newsletters, hosted the World Endometriosis Organisations prior to World Congress for Endometriosis in Sydney. Additionally, EA developed a workplace Learning Management System with educational modules, and worked on culturally appropriate resources for priority populations through research partnerships.



World Endometriosis Organisation Event took place on the 27th of May 2025 hosted by Endometriosis Australia, a founding member of WEO. To coincide with the World Endometriosis Congress in Sydney. This gathering brought together global advocates and change-makers dedicated to advancing the future of endometriosis care and awareness.

Highlights

- Inspiring Presentations: Attendees heard from organisations sharing their journeys and strategies, underscoring the importance of adaptability in a rapidly evolving landscape.
- Engaging Discussions: Participants engaged in thought-provoking conversations on diversity and inclusion, emphasising the need for equitable care for everyone.
- Innovative Education Campaigns: Discoveries were made through campaigns aimed at empowering and informing communities, along with cutting-edge research that highlighted the significance of co-designing solutions with consumers.
- Cool Campaigns: Attendees were inspired by initiatives that are changing the narrative around endometriosis and explored creative fundraising approaches that drive progress.

Together, we paved the way for a future where awareness, understanding, and support for those affected by endometriosis flourish.

Outcomes

The event received overwhelming praise from another international organisation for Endometriosis Australia's advocacy and research, securing government funding for programs, and leading the world.

Our corporate partnerships grew stronger in FY2025, with new partners joining our March Awareness Campaign and others supporting us throughout the year.

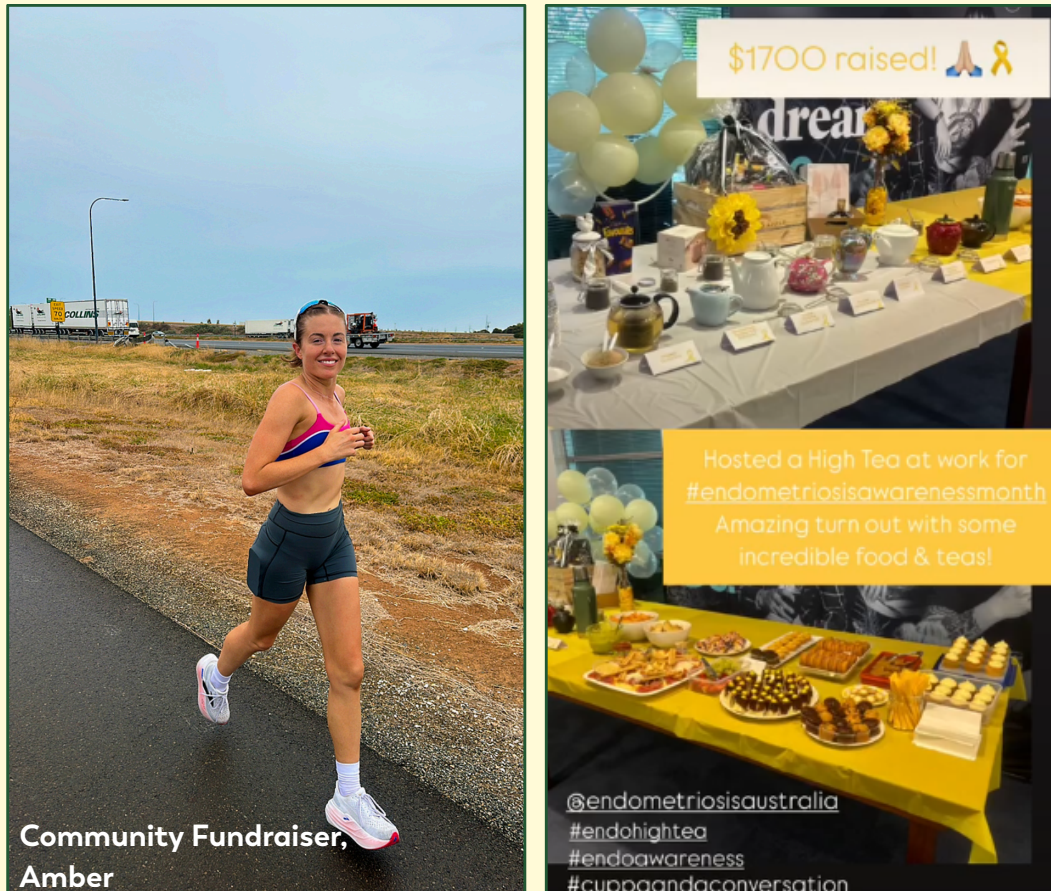
- \$21,319 was donated through percentage-of-sales initiatives, raising both critical awareness and essential funds.

Community Fundraising: Grassroots Power

Our community-led efforts raised an outstanding \$242,741 this year!

- March Awareness Month delivered the strongest results, generating \$72,593.
- March Into Yellow raised \$9,992 with 27 passionate fundraisers, and High Time for Tea contributed \$12,520 thanks to 17 dedicated participants.
- DIY Fundraising thrived year-round, with 105 fundraisers contributing \$155,954.

One standout story: Amber, who ran over 525 km from Glenelg to Broken Hill—about 75 km per day for seven days—raising \$20,129 to support the 1 in 7 women impacted by endometriosis. Her determination reflects the incredible spirit of our community.

Trusts and Grants

We secured \$275,121 from trusts, foundations, major donors, and grants—providing essential support for programs and initiatives that change lives.

FEDERALLY FUNDED PROGRAMS AND IMPACT

Peak Body – Community Awareness

2024 – 2025 were pivotal years for Endometriosis Australia’s awareness initiatives. Our awareness campaign strategy centred on three pillars – Awareness, Research, and Education – woven into campaign messages and activities to amplify visibility and advocacy for people affected by endometriosis.

The 2024 – 2025 Awareness Campaign aimed to raise awareness of endometriosis and who it affects, to dispel common myths and to encourage people to seek medical advice and visit EndoAustralia.org. By highlighting real stories from our community, we also aimed to help people feel heard and safe, and to bolster a sense of community.

Delivered via community service announcements (CSAs) on popular national radio networks (HITT, Triple M and Listnr), television commercials on regional networks and social media channel engagement, the campaign had extraordinarily wide reach.

Together with our partners Southern Cross Austereo (SCA) and their donation of production and distribution of radio advertisements across their national network , we delivered:

Our appeal campaigns for [Christmas 2024](#), [Endo Giving Day 2025](#), and [EOFY 2025](#) campaigns helped maintain the awareness of endometriosis across the community.

Our campaigns have successfully driven traffic to the Endometriosis Australia website for further information, with website traffic up 23% in 2024 – 2025. Our strong and engaged online community helps us reach more people, raise awareness nationally, and mobilise support where it is needed most.

As evidenced by the comments across our posts, our community feel safe to share their stories with us and feel connected and represented.

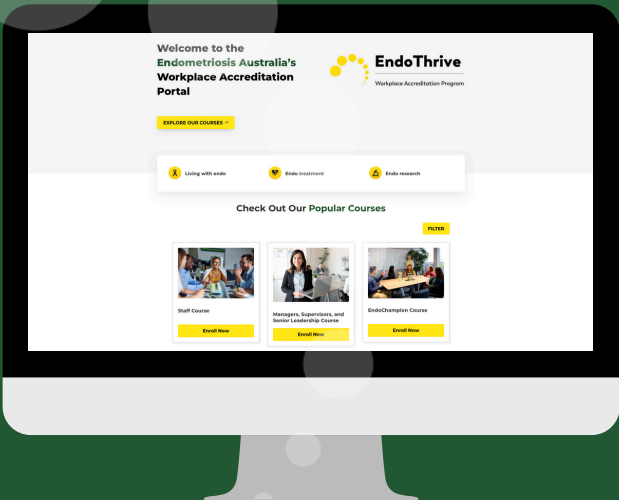

Workplace Accreditation Program

In early 2025, three organisations piloted the EndoThrive initiative, with over 100 employees completing the online course. Two of these organisations have achieved workplace accreditation already, with 60%+ of their staff having completed the course.

- Managers within the accredited organisations, Showpo and Eve Health, report noticing improved awareness, confidence, and psychological safety in relation to endometriosis in the workplace.
- Employees were reported to feel “seen, supported, and safe to seek help.”

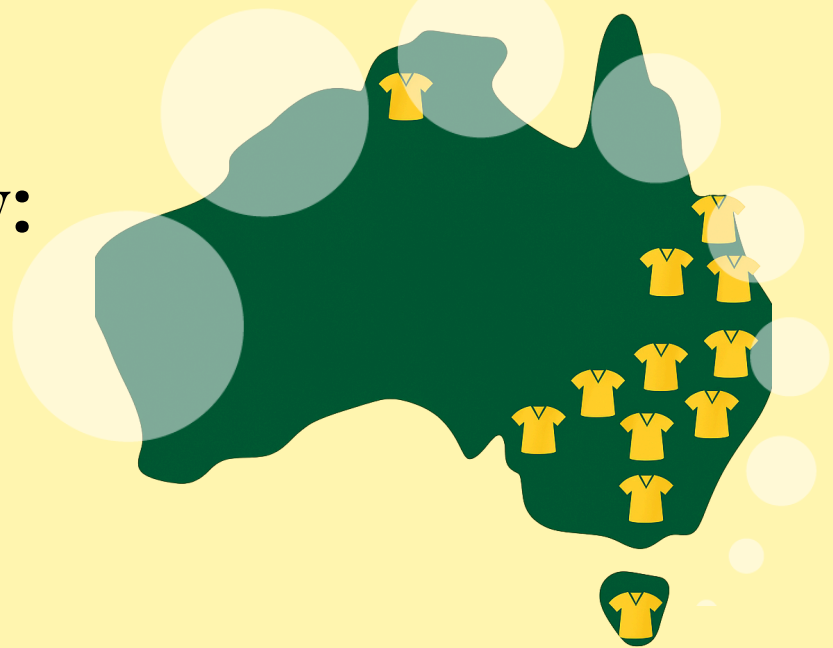

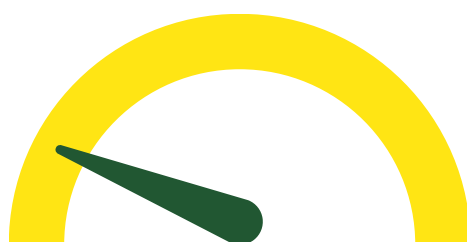

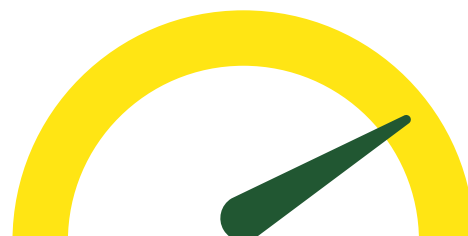
Funding Innovative Research

These grant opportunities are pivotal, ensuring that emerging researchers have the support they need for promising endometriosis projects to take flight and be well placed to secure major investment

Endometriosis Australia is the largest charity funder of endometriosis research grants, promoting innovative research across medical, surgical, allied health, and patient education. Since 2017 we have distributed over \$800,000 across 21 seed research grants, including \$142,742 to support three research initiatives in 2024

Why support matters

From Professor Louise Hull



Endometriosis Australia awarded Professor Louise Hull a \$30,000 research grant in 2020, giving her the critical early evidence needed to secure major government funding and expand her work into non-invasive imaging for young people with endometriosis. These grant opportunities are pivotal, ensuring that emerging researchers have the support they need for promising endometriosis projects to take flight.

“ Australia’s progress in endometriosis research has been driven by collaborative teams who work together to tackle a historically under-recognised condition. Early funding is what allows these groups to generate the initial evidence needed to advance their work.

Charitable investment has been crucial, giving researchers their first real opportunity to develop promising ideas and secure major government grants. This support creates a pathway for emerging projects to grow into research that can genuinely change outcomes for people with endometriosis.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Kim Gyi

I am pleased to present the Treasurer's Report for Endometriosis Australia Ltd for the financial year ended 30 June 2025.

This year has been one of continued delivery, consolidation, and disciplined governance. We maintained strong oversight of financial management, risk, and compliance, with the external auditors issuing an unqualified opinion and raising no material findings for the 2024/25 financial statements.

Financial Performance

Total revenue for FY25 was \$1.11 million, reflecting the organisation's ability to attract broad-based support across the community, government, and partners.

Key revenue streams included:

- Donations: \$749,148
- Federal Government Grants: \$292,700
- Research Grants: \$22,273
- Fundraising & Merchandise: \$7,145
- Fee-for-Service: \$40,350 — a growing stream linked to education and capacity-building initiatives.

During the year, the organisation delivered a significant volume of grant-funded and mission-driven activity, including awareness campaigns, education programs, research investments, and national engagement initiatives aligned with our strategic pillars.

Cash Reserves & Financial Position

Endometriosis Australia remains financially secure with net assets of \$859,248 and cash holdings of \$1.19 million at year end. Importantly, these cash holdings do not represent discretionary or surplus funds. A substantial portion relates to:

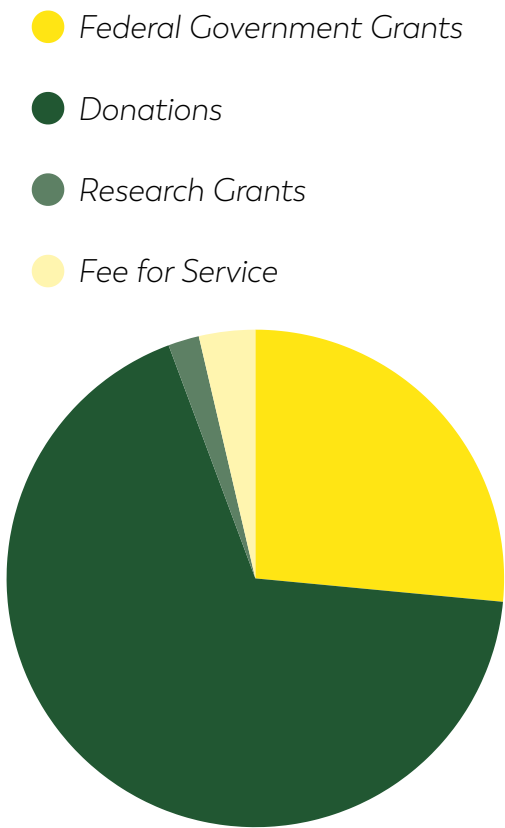
- grants received in advance, which are contractually tied to specific program deliverables across future periods, and
- prudent operating reserves, maintained to ensure continuity of services, manage fluctuations in funding cycles, and safeguard long-term sustainability.

These reserves allow the organisation to meet obligations confidently while continuing to serve the endometriosis community without interruption.

Sustainability & Ongoing Support

While reserves provide stability, the organisation's core mission — including education, research, advocacy, and community support — continues to rely heavily on philanthropic contributions. Donor generosity remains central to expanding our reach, strengthening impact, and ensuring Australians living with endometriosis receive the support they deserve. We extend our sincere appreciation to every supporter who makes this work possible.

**INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF
ENDOMETRIOSIS AUSTRALIA LIMITED**

Opinion

We have audited the financial report of Endometriosis Australia Limited (the Company), which comprises the statement of financial position as at 30 June 2025, the statement of comprehensive income, statement of changes in equity and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of material accounting policies, and the declaration by those charged with governance.

In our opinion the financial report of Endometriosis Australia Limited has been prepared in accordance with Division 60 of the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission Act 2012 (ACNC Act), including:
